Similarities with the teaching of Jesus: "there are more parallels in this Epistle than in any other New Testament book to the teaching of our Lord in the Gospels. Example: The Sermon on the Mount:

James' speech in <u>Acts 15</u> contains many striking parallels in language with the epistle of James. For example, $\chi\alpha(\rho\omega)$ is found in <u>Jas. 1:1</u> and <u>Acts 15:23</u> (and elsewhere in Acts only in 23:26); <u>Acts 15:17</u> and <u>Jas. 2:7</u> invoke God's name in a special way; the exhortation for the brothers ($\dot{\alpha}\delta\epsilon\lambda\phi\sigma$) to hear is found both in <u>Jas. 2:5</u> and <u>Acts 15:13</u>. Further, not-so-common individual words are found in both: $\dot{\epsilon}\pi i\sigma\kappa\dot{\epsilon}\pi\tau\epsilon\sigma\theta\epsilon$ (Jas. 1:27; <u>Acts 15:14</u>); $\dot{\epsilon}\pi i\sigma\tau\rho\dot{\epsilon}\phi\epsiloni\nu$ (Jas. 5:19 and <u>Acts 15:19</u>); $\tau\eta\rho\epsiloni\nu$ (or $\deltai\alpha\tau\eta\rho\epsiloni\nu)\dot{\epsilon}\alpha\nu\tau\dot{\epsilon}\nu$ (Jas. 1:27; <u>Acts 15:29</u>); $\dot{\alpha}\gamma\alpha\pi\eta\tau\dot{\epsilon}\varsigma$ (Jas. 1:16, 19; 2:5; <u>Acts 15:25</u>). Though short of conclusive proof, this is nevertheless significant corroborative evidence.

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
